The discharge law in Illinois



Many times when we are faced with the duty of taking our loved ones to the hospital, one thing always runs in our mind; how can they get better? The hospital staff also shares the same sentiments but frankly, these intimidating trips to the hospital has more concerns to it than just treatment and recuperation.

Aging is an inevitable part of everyone's life and the once strong and mighty body, is expected to turn weak and feeble. No need to panic though, because doctors have the adroitness to put us back in shape.

As a caregiver, taking a loved one to the hospital calls for extra attention; inside and outside of the hospital. However, it has come to light that little thought is usually given to what happens when the loved one is deemed fit to leave the hospital, yet the well-being of the loved one is also highly hinged on this transition.

Studies have pointed out on how a well-planned discharge and transition from hospital can positively contribute to the patient's health especially when a next level of care is considered. The patient's safety is another important aspect that highly depends on how they are discharged.

Therefore, to ensure a sustainable society where the aged and patients are not considered to be a burden, especially during the discharge process, there are laws and regulations put in place to govern their wellbeing right from when they get admitted in the hospital to when they get discharged.

In Illinois and many other states, negligence of patients is unacceptable to say the least. All citizens have a right to good healthcare services regardless of their age or background.

Prescreening before discharge

In order to curb the rising mortality rate caused by negligence of discharged patients, a valid hospital discharge is only possible when the hospital notifies the Care Coordination Unit (CCU) of a patient's pending discharge to a reputable nursing facility at least twenty-

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four hours before the discharge is effected, so that the Care Coordination Unit (CCU) can perform the prescreening.

It is mandatory that the hospital discharge planner communicates with the CCU regarding the selection of the nursing facility after completion of the prescreening so that required documentation can be sent by the CCU to the relevant nursing facility. The core purpose of the prescreening is to help prevent institutionalization that can be avoided.

Laws behind visitation

Visitors to patients heavily contribute towards the quick recovery of patients, because some diseases are more psychologically dealt with. Therefore, the good handling of visitors is imperative. There are laws governing how visitors should be handled. These laws also place boundaries between the patients and visitors so that the health of both the visitor and patient are not compromised. These laws doesn't permit visitors to discharge patients unless when designated as the caregiver.

Caregiver as the advocate

Sometimes, unforeseen circumstances may necessitate the discharge or transfer of a patient to another facility. There are laws strategically put in place to reduce friction between the hospital and relevant stakeholders in the entire process. Of utmost priority is the health of the patient therefore in handling the issues that may arise the law demands that nothing in the Act should delay the discharge of a patient or the transfer of a patient from a hospital to another institution or facility.

In the case where a relative or friend isn't available to take the patient home, a caregiver can be hired for this. When the elderly is to be taken home, a home care aide can be hired and when the elderly has a prescription that can be administered by a medical personnel at home, a home health care can be hired instead.

In closing, when these laws are adhered to assurance of the safety of discharged patients will be a walk in the park.

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Furthermore, the health of a patient after discharged will be easily maintained when the patient, family members, friends, caregivers and healthcare providers collaborate seamlessly.

When everyone plays their part, seniors will receive the best care in the long run.
